
Background: expected outcomes



- 1. Less: complexity, duplication and ambiguity
- 2. Easier to understand, administer and use
- 3. Continuing to achieve regulatory outcomes that trading partners expect
- 4. Swifter Government responses to changes in market conditions
- 5. Supporting exporters to innovate and pursue opportunities
- 6. Broader range of compliance and enforcement powers giving a further level of assurance of the integrity of our export system.

Future state of export control legislation






*Note: these are two legislative instruments.

Organic Goods Legislation Timeline





Features of the draft legislation



The Export Control Act and the Export Control Rules must be read together – the rules provide the operational detail to the Act.

Export Control Act

- Regulatory "toolbox" for agricultural products.
- Common export requirements.

Export Control Rules

- The "who", "what", and "how" of exporting specific commodities.
- Seeks to ensure importing country requirements and standards are met.
- Replace current Regulations and Orders.

Policy

- Provides more detail and guidance about how to meet legislative requirements.
- Includes application forms, records and IT systems.

Key changes proposed under the draft organic goods rules



Proposed key changes

- Introduction of Approved Arrangements to replace QM Certificates
- Inclusion of a reference to the National Standard for Organic and Bio-Dynamic Produce in the legislation
- Amending the scope of the regulation to exclude exported organic cosmetic products
 - The department is seeking industry feedback on this or other options, including definition/s.

Chapter 1 – Definitions



Key definitions in Draft Organic Goods Rules

Organic Goods Means goods that, for the purpose of marketing, are described as, or described as including ingredients that are, organic, biodynamic, biological, ecological or any other similar description, and includes goods that are described as in conversion to organic or biodynamic.

Cosmetic Goods

- Organic goods that are cosmetic goods will not be prescribed unless the goods are intended to be exported to a country that requires an organic goods certificate
- Examples of cosmetic products include skin care creams, fragrances, colour cosmetics, deodorants, soaps and shampoos

Chapter 2 – Government Certificates



What changed?

 An 'organic produce certificate' will be known as an 'organic goods certificate'

Key provisions in Export Control Act

 Government certificates can be issued for goods that will be, or have been, exported.

Key provisions in Draft Organic Goods Rules

- When and how organic goods certificates for prescribed and non-prescribed goods are issued
- Requirement that must be met before an organic goods certificate may be issued.

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Chapter 2 – Government Certificates



- An organic goods certificate can be issued by an approved certifying body and the Secretary
- Before an organic goods certificate can be issued:
 - the export operations must have been carried out in accordance with the National Organic Standard
 - all applicable requirements must have been complied with
 - all importing country requirements must have been met

Chapter 5 – Approved Arrangements



Key feature

- An approved arrangement will replace approved QM certificates for organisations – Approved Arrangements assist in maintaining the integrity of Australia's export system and are used currently across a range of regulated export commodities.
- An approved QM certificate for organisations that is in force immediately before the commencement of the Act will automatically transition to an Approved Arrangement as if it was approved under the Act
- An Approved Arrangement must ensure that the requirements of the National Organic Standards are met in relation to organic goods
- The holder of an Approved Arrangement must notify the Secretary of critical non-compliance
- The holder of an Approved Arrangement and a person who manages or controls the organic good certification operations will be required to be a fit and proper person

Chapter 8 – Trade Descriptions



What changed?

There is no change to these provisions from the current approach

Key provisions in Export Control Act

- A trade description can be "applied" through documents associated with a consignment
- Can be provided through information in:
 - · Government certificates.

- Trade description must be applied
- Trade description must contain certain information
- General requirements for a trade description
- Trade descriptions in a language other than English.

Chapter 9 - Audits



What changed?

• There is no change to these provisions from the current approach

Key provisions in Export Control Act

- When audits can be conducted, and what or who can be audited
- Who may conduct an audit
- How an audit may be conducted
- Relevant person must provide assistance
- Powers of auditors

- Manner in which an audit must be conducted
- Audit reports
- Requirements for approved auditors

Chapter 10 – Compliance & Enforcement



What changed?

• There is no change to these provisions from the current approach

Key provisions in Export Control Act

- Guidance on the compliance and enforcement of the Act and the Organic Goods Rules
- How the Regulatory Powers Act applies
- Powers in emergency situations
- Civil penalties and infringement notices

Key provisions in Draft Organic Goods Rules

 Dealing with samples and things seized in exercising monitoring and investigation powers

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Chapter 11 – Miscellaneous



What changed?

• There is no change to these provisions from the current approach

- Review of decisions
- Retention of records
- Storage requirements for samples of organic goods
- Damaged and destroyed organic goods
- Relevant Commonwealth liabilities

Implementation – Transitioning to the improved framework



- The department is aiming for a seamless transition from the existing export legislative framework to the new framework.
- The legislation will transition existing arrangements, wherever possible, into the improved framework when it commences. Including:
 - QM Certificates into Approved Arrangements
 - Existing government certificates

The department will work with stakeholders to ensure a smooth transition.

- As work progresses, we will provide information on implementation, including:
 - Review of training and instructional material
 - Revision of application forms, where needed
 - Identifying opportunities to streamline and standardise processes (including using IT)
